## Legacy Project Benefit raises over \$4000 for memorial

Volunteers from D&D Auctioneers wrung every dime they could out of those in attendance for the Armed Forces Legacy Project dinner and auction. They auctioned everything from pies and cookies to collectible Budweiser beer steins and patriotic memorabilia. "We were thrilled and delighted with the attendance and response to our plea for much needed financial assistance. The Legacy Project will be completed because we get this kind of involvement from our communities," said Michael Stewart, one of the organizers of the event.

**TONASKET** - A benefit dinner and auction for the Tonasket Legacy Project, a memorial to all those who have served in this nation's armed forces, raised over \$4300 last Saturday night.

The evening at the Tonasket Eagles Aerie started off with a dinner and was followed by the auction which featured what seemed like an endless number of pies, cookies and other homemade baked goods, as well as many donated items, most with a patriotic or military theme.

"We had 100 for dinner...it was a great turnout," said Michael Stewart, one of the organizers of the event.

George Frank, who helped get the project started at its very beginnings, echoed Stewart's remarks about the turnout. "It was just great," he said, about the number of people in attendance and the meal the Tonasket Eagles put together.

The auction, which was called by volunteers from D&D Auctions, had some surprising results with one donated huckleberry pie going for a bid of \$200.

"We were thrilled and delighted with the attendance and response to our plea for much needed financial assistance. The Legacy Project will be completed because we get this kind of involvement from our communities," said Stewart.

After the ground has thawed plans are in the works to begin laying the infrastructure for utilities such as electrical and plumbing, according to Stewart. When that is done the ground can be prepared for the tall columnar basalt rocks, the wall, restrooms and other amenities planned for the site.
